m T}$ hanks to the generosity of Ray Okonski, who has been working with the Friends of Polish Art in Detroit and the ACPC Savannah General Pulaski Committee, a tablet to honor General Pulaski will be placed on the battlefield where

he fell. This project is being coordinated with the Georgia Coastal Heritage Society (GCHS) which administers the site. The tablet will be officially dedicated on Monday, October 9, 2017 on the

238th anniversary of the battle. The ACPC Board has decided to hold its Autumn meeting in Savannah during that weekend with members remaining through Monday in order to participate in the ceremonies (details are posted on the web site). All members of the ACPC, friends and admirers of the General are invited. Prominent Polish-American Historian Edward Pinkowski, now 100 years of age and living in Florida, has always had an interest in Pulaski. It is hoped that he and his son Jack will attend the event.

This is not the first time the ACPC has been involved with the battlefield in Savannah. In 2003, the City of Savannah purchased the battlefield and began to work with archaeologists of the GCHS who located the original Spring Hill Redoubt in August, 2005. Now that site features a reconstruction of the earthworks, to show visitors what the redoubt would have looked like. To honor those patriots who died or were wounded during the battle, 800 Georgia granite tablets were installed at the site. The stones are arranged in ranks of ten and represent the attacking columns. Five such columns attacked British enemy lines.

When the renovations on the site were in progress, the ACPC was invited by the GCHS to sponsor a stone tablet for the Poles who fought at Savannah. The stone

would have the country POLAND and the name of sponsoring organization. Our late friend and member Paul Bosse led the successful fund raising effort. Similar stone tablets were funded by ethnic organizations for the countries which sent soldiers to the battle: France, Haiti, Germany, Scotland, Ireland and Sweden. These are located in a prominent place near the entrance to the park.

ver thirty dozen *pączki* in a variety of flavors were sold by the Polish Cultural Club of Greater Hartford (PCCGH) at "Pączki na Karnawał" on February 26, the Sunday before Ash Wednesday. This event commemorates the Polish pre-Lenten custom of *Tłusty Czwartek* (Fat Thursday).

On March 23, 2017, a capacity crowd enjoyed a lecture and slide presentation on the 100th Anniversary of America's National Parks conducted by Dr. Richard Benfield, Professor of Geography at Central Connecticut State University. The program concluded with a tempting array of Polish and American desserts.

Club member, Mark Milewski, who reached the summit of 29,029 foot Mt. Everest on May 20, 2016, has been sharing the story of his 50 day-long expedition in area lectures by placing Mt. Everest into the context of the Golden Age of Polish Himalayan Climbing of the 1980s and 1990s. Interestingly, during this period, Poles dominated the 8,000-meter Himalayan peaks with numerous winter and first ascents. In addition to his own personal account, Mr. Milewski has been relating the stories of Jerzy Kukuczka, Wanda Rutkiewicz, Krzysztof Wielicki, and many others – tales of adventure in high places that lift the human spirit and constitute a chapter of Polish history that is little known outside of international climbing circles.

"An Exclusive Sunday at the Museum" featuring the grand premiere of two Polish folk art exhibits, was held on Sunday, April 30, 2017. at the Polish Center of Discovery and Learning in Chicopee, MA. This event was in collaboration with the PCCGH. One exhibit showcased 32 exquisite original costumes representing various regions of Poland, which are the gift of Krystyna Słowikowska Farley, a Club founder and

member. A lecture on the costumes was presented by Staś Radosz, Executive Director of the Polish Center. Krystyna was present as the special guest of honor. The second exhibit is a recent acquisition from the estate of Bernard Pajewski, a former Club member, showcasing one of the largest privately owned collections of Polish folk art in the U.S. Noted iconographer and historian, Marek Czarnecki, offered commentary on Mr. Pajewski and his extraordinary Polish artifacts. As part of the ceremonies, Mr. Radosz received the Polish Cultural Club's "Distinguished Service Award" paying tribute to his many years of devoted service to the Polish Center of Discovery and Learning and his tireless work on behalf of Polonia. he Friends of Polish Art from Detroit (FPA) was among the awardees at the Installation Ceremony and Awards Presentation Banquet of the Polish American Congress, Michigan Division (PAC-MI), Saturday, April 8, at the PNA Hall in Hamtramck, Michigan.

It is a long tradition that, during its Installation of Officers ceremony, the Polish American Congress Michigan Division presents awards to Polish American organizations celebrating its milestone anniversaries, as well as individuals that in outstanding way contribute to the Polish American community of Michigan.

This year, PAC-MI presented one of its awards to the Friends of Polish Art. While introducing FPA, Sebastian Szczepanski (member of FPA Board of Directors), who served as Master of Ceremonies for the banquet, recalled the humble beginnings of FPA's activities. It was 80 years ago (1937) when a group of Detroit citizens led by Miss Florence Cassidy, Secretary of the Nationality Committee of the Detroit Council of Social Agencies, organized under the name Friends of Polish Art. They were inspired by the enthusiasm created by Miss Marya Werten's lectures and exhibits on Polish folk art and costumes. The initial goals were very specific including making examples of modern Polish wood cuts available for use in Detroit; to act as a central bureau through which teachers and social workers could purchase Polish

materials; to arrange for loan exhibits of modern Polish art and folk art; to raise funds for the purchase of Polish art objects for the Detroit Institute of Arts, and to stimulate a general interest in Polish art. Ann Bankowski, the President of the Polish American Congress presented the award to the current FPA President, Richard Lapham.

> Two weeks later, on Sunday, April 23, the FPA joined Polish National Alliance District X Women's Division to celebrate the Easter Season. A joint Święconka took place at the PNA Hall in Hamtramck, MI, and featured a traditional Easter dinner, entertainment and a basket raffle.

Marcia Lewandowski, Christine Kryszko and students of the Kazimierz Pulaski Polish School made presentation of the meaning of Easter Basket as well as the traditions of Polish Easter holiday. A Special Easter blessing was conducted by Fr. Miroslaw Frankowski, pastor of St. Florian Parish in Hamtramck. Later in the program, lively performances by the

Annual PAAA Chopin Concert

n March 5, 2017, the Polish American Arts Association (PAAA) of Washington, D. C., held its Annual Chopin Concert, at the Embassy of the Republic of Poland. After a few breaks from solo piano recitals in 2013 (Andrzej Stec, tenor), 2015 (the Borovsky siblings on violin, cello and piano), and 2016 (Krzysztof Zimowski, violin, accompanied on piano by Jarosław Gołembiowski), the audience was ready to hear a full program of piano pieces performed on the Embassy's Steinway once owned by Ignacy Jan Paderewski. The concert, which benefits the PAAA Scholarship Fund, was performed by the young but already highly accomplished pianist Tomasz Robak (photo at right). A doctoral student at the Peabody Institute in Baltimore, Tomasz was the recipient of a PAAA scholarship grant in 2016.

Tomasz's recital, which included music of Fryderyk Chopin, as well as other Polish composers, can easily be called a revelation. The high point of the program was Chopin's *Ballade in G minor*, *Op.* 23, rendered in bravura style that is inherent in this musical form, invented by Chopin. Other Chopin works were the *Waltz in E Minor* and the "*Heroic*" *Polonaise in A-flat*, played at a fast tempo, but with absolute accuracy and dazzling technique, yet with emotional depth.

Works of lesser-known Polish composers were a welcome addition to the oft-heard repertoire of Chopin and Ignacy Jan Paderewski – especially the variations on a Ukrainian folk tune by Franciszek Lessel, a predecessor of Chopin who studied with Haydn in Vienna. The 4 Etudes, op. 4, by Karol Szymanowski completed the program.

PAAA Wianki on the National Mall

For thirty-five years now, on a Saturday in June closest to the St. John's Eve, both Polish and non-Polish visitors to the National Mall in Washington, DC, including tourists from all over the world, stop and listen to Polish melodies and feast their eyes on colorful traditional costumes of dancers as they spin and leap in lively dances from various regions of Poland. As the night falls, girls in white robes carry freshly made floral wreaths to the water of the Reflecting Pool near the Lincoln Memorial.

This is the Festival of Wreaths, known as *Wianki* which the PAAA produces annually. It is a sight to behold so if you are in or near Washington on June 24 of this year, make sure to come to the Mall and enjoy the festivities. You can find more information at http://www.paaa.us/index.html



Friends of John Paul II Foundation

The Friends of JP II Foundation, Washington D.C. Chapter, honored Monsigor Czarnecki and did outreach at a local university Catholic Student Center. The Honoree at the annual "Wadowice-on-the-Potomac" celebration in October 2016, was Monsigor Anthony Czarnecki, Rector of St. Joseph Basilica in Webster, MA. The Parish, founded in 1887, is the oldest Polish American Catholic community in New England. The Pope elevated the Parish to a Basilica in October, 1998.

Monsigor Czarnecki served for many years on the International Committee of the Vatican JPII Foundation established by Pope John Paul II and helped to organize several chapters of the Foundation in the United States including the New England JPII Foundation. He was instrumental in establishing the JPII Cultural Center in Washington, DC, which was acquired in recent years by the Knights of Columbus. Monsigor Czarnecki continues to work closely with the Knights of Columbus to promote the legacy of John Paul II and his National Shrine.

The Wadowice award, a custom-designed crystal image of himself with Pope John Paul II, was presented to the Monsigor by President Bozenna Buda and Director Dr. Edwarda Buda-Okreglak.

In March 2017, the JPII Friends again sponsored a Polish dinner for students (Catholic Terps) at the University of Maryland Catholic Student Center. This outreach to the community to promote the legacy and teachings of St. John Paul II was met with much enthusiasm and appreciation. 80TH EXHIBITION OF PAINTING AND SCULPTURE

The Exhibition of Painting and Sculpture is the premiere event of the Polish Arts Club of Chicago. Since its inception in 1933, the exhibition has showcased

Polish-American artists. Emerging artists have the opportunity to exhibit their works to the public, while established artists use the exhibition to showcase how their talent has evolved.

This year, the 80th Exhibition of Painting and Sculpture was held at the Polish Museum of America in Chicago. The Exhibition opened on Saturday, April 22, with a gala reception. Approximately 150

guests attended the reception, admiring the works exhibited while enjoying gourmet hors d'oeuvres generously provided by Montrose Deli. The exhibition featured a total of 11 sculptures and 133 paintings, in a wide range of media including oil, acrylic, and watercolor. These represented the works of 39 artists, amateur and professional, young and not-so-young, from a variety of backgrounds, training, and expertise. All shared a love and dedication to art.

According to the Club's President H. Kupala Night opens "Cultural Exchange Festival 2017"

American Music Festivals and the Chicago Chopin Society are partnering for a three concert Festival of cultural exchange and community collaboration beginning with "Kupala - A Celebration of Ukrainian, Lithuanian, Belarussian, and Polish Music" Sunday, June 11, at 5:00 p.m. The concert will be held at St. Barbara Catholic Parish, 2859 S. Throop, Chicago. The concert will feature the Lincolnwood Chamber Orchestra, St. Barbara Holy Name Society Choir, and composer/pianist Jaroslaw Golembiowski performing classical and folk music celebrating Slavic and Baltic culture and the summer solstice. Philip Simmons conducts the LCO in a diverse program including works by Lysenko, Čiurlionis, Moniuszko, Ogiński, and Howard Hanson.

The Chicago Chopin Society, which promotes Polish music and history around the world, and American Music Festivals, which regularly partners with numerous communities throughout Chicago and internationally, have already presented successful programming together. Their base of operations is Chicago's Copernicus Center, and "Cultural Exchange Festival 2017" will include two concerts at the Jefferson Park venue, a "Polish-American Friendship Concert" on September 2 (at Taste of Polonia), and "Christmas Spectacular" on December 17. Jaroslaw Golembiowski, Founder and President of the Chicago Chopin Society, has accepted the newly created position of Program Manager of American Music Festivals, which is a volunteer position.

"Kupala Night - A Celebration of Ukrainian, Lithuanian, Belarussian, and Polish Music," will welcome in the sum-

mer solstice. Known throughout Europe as "St. John's Day," For generations Kupala brought Ukrainians, Lithuanians, Belarusians, and Polish people together in joyous celebration. The concert will explore cultural connections, shared history, and friendship.

On Saturday, September 2, at 4:00 p.m., at *Taste of Polonia*, the Cultural Exchange Festival will continue with the "Polish-American Friendship Concert: Honoring the 200th Anniversary of the Death of Thaddeus Koscuiszko." The American Revolutionary War hero will be remembered Labor Day weekend in music, story, and film for his many humanitarian contributions around the world. Koscuiszko's music will be performed, alongside patriotic works by Chopin, Kurpinski, Vieutemps, John Philip Sousa, and a new work by Jaroslaw Golembiowski. Soloists will be violinist Violetta Todorova and soprano Justine Izewski.

The Festival concludes with the second annual "Christmas Spectacular," also at the Copernicus Center, 5216 W. Lawrence in Chicago. This family program will feature a sing along Messiah and carols, letters and music from Chopin to his family for the Holidays, and the orchestral debut of six year old vocalist Penelope Simmons, daughter of American Music Festivals Artistic Director Philip Simmons. Harpsichordist Danuta Kuzminska will also perform.



Amanda Plazek Bruce is pursuing a Master of Arts degree in Music History and Literature at Youngstown State University, Ohio. She is a graduate of Duquesne University in Pittsburgh. Her faculty advi-

Michael Anthony Chrusciel is studying medicine and library science at Wayne State University, Michigan. Behind him is an extensive agenda of travel that includes (among other places) Poland, Afghanistan and Cuba. He is active in Polish-American life and, in April 2011, he conducted research on attitudes in Poland toward cell and organ transplantation. The reports he submitted with his application were

outstanding. In addition to Polish, he is also proficient in French. His faculty advisor states: "I believe Michael exemplifies the ideal qualities of a Pulaski Scholarship recipient, maintaining his involvement in the Polish-American community despite the rigors of medical school. For example, he regularly attends screenings of and lectures about contemporary Polish films at Wayne State University and recently delivered a presentation of his research on Poland's footprint in Afghanistan and Moldova this past fall (2016) to the Friends of the Polish Art organization."

David Liebers is at Harvard University's Medical School, specializing in Psychiatry (with interest in schizophrenia and bipolar disorder). He is a graduate of the University of Rochester (New York) and Cambridge University, Trinity College, UK. In 2014, he was recruited by Undersecretary of State Jadwiga Emelewicz to advise the Polish government in the creation of a publicly funded



center for biotechnology and healthcare innovation. As a Fulbright Scholar (2010-2011), he supported victims of political repression in Belarus and Ukraine. He is active in the Polish Club at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, and is also an amateur boxer.



Gabriella Szewczyk is studying at the University of Illinois College of Dentistry, in Chicago. Her undergraduate degree is from the University of Michigan. Her interest is focused on Oral Medicine, including deadly mouth cancers. Gabriella wants to be a dental educator and researcher. She is involved in Graduate Women in Science and the Dental

Charity Foundation. Her research mentor writes: "As a graduate student, Gabriella is making substantial progress on her projects, and we are quite excited about one lead in particular. The ongoing research theme in my lab is dedicated to understanding cell-to-cell communication processes of bacteria. Gabriella has devised a plan to investigate chemical signaling used by a primary oral pathogen, called Streptococcus mutans and how signaling may contribute in relationships with other microbes and lead to exacerbated disease."

Virginia Whealton is at Indiana University in Bloomington, a Ph.D. Candidate in Musicology. She maintains her musical proficiency as principal second violinist and sectional coach for the campus orchestra. Her dissertation is entitled: "Travel, Ideology, and the Geographical Imagination: Parisian Musical Travelogues, 1830-1870." Among her publications is an article in the



Journal of the American Liszt Society about Chopin and Liszt (2012). Her research took her to London, Warsaw and Stockholm. She is proficient in French and a freelance academic translator. Her faculty advisor wrote: "Virginia's scholarly work has intellectual depth and elegance. She has all the qualities that make a superb scholar." Virginia is also a 2017 scholarship award recipient from the Polish American Arts Association of Washington, D. C.,
